



Resident Council is the decision-making leadership team for the community, they participate in leadership training, run meetings, speak to City Council or other City commissions, and are the primary contacts between the community and partners.

Since all of the resident council members live in the community, they are excellent connectors, always striving to create a welcoming group for old and new participants.

You can help - HOPE Volunteers

HOPE Volunteer staff are integral to the everyday operations of the HOPE Initiative, and its continued success in 5th Ward.

The volunteer staff encompasses all non-paid personnel who contriube to helping with the goals of the HOPE Initiative. These include community members, Allegheny students, and everyday people from the City of Meadville.

HOPE Volunteers help deliver the monthly newsletter to the people of 5th Ward, participate in community beautification projects, and help maintain the community garden.

The Volunteer Staff love the work they do, and are amazed at HOPE's fantastic growth, and find it remarkable how the community has come together in recent years.



Health refers to the improvement of living standards and promotion of healthy habits for our communities and the individuals living within them. Examples include mental health cafes and neighborhood walking groups.

Summer Picnic



Each summer a community picnic is held in 5th Ward where we share all we've achieved in the community, report community health data, have listening sessions for future community goals and of course have lots of good food and fun!

This event brings neighbors together to strengthen relationships and help people be active within community.

In 2023 we celebrated the grand opening of the HOPE Memorial Community Garden and saw so many new and happy faces. The picnic was well attended, boasting more than 60 attendees, including representatives of local government and other community resource partners.

HOPE Health Plan



Each year the Resident Council creates a community health plan based on the input and needs of the community. There are at least two goals under each pillar and as the goals are met the council adds a new one.

Examples include: the provision of fresh food from the community garden, development and launch of the snow removal/lawncare service program, improving communications with law enforcement regarding safety issues, improving communications with the city on public works needs, and the involvement of community members in walking groups to facilitate safe and healthy summer parks programming.



Opportunity refers to the creation of services and activities in the community, and the use of said services and activities when they arise. Examples include comittee creations, and public works programs to improve the community.

HOPE Greenscaping



After seeing some residents lacked the means or physical ability to care for their lawns and walkways, the council felt compelled to help residents with their greenscaping needs.

After many brainstorming and planning sessions the

resident council partnered with Allegheny's community engaged learning and sub-grant program and created the Harmony Greenscape Project.

Now community members can pay a small monthly fee, avoiding citations regarding property maintenance. Donations are also accepted to cover the costs for those who cannot afford the small fee due to financial hardship.

After School Program



Seeing that many students in 5th Ward were struggling academically and socially, to address these needs, HOPE decided to run an after school program twice a

Our program boasts non-tech time (only

exception is school issued laptops that homework must be done on), social skills opportunities, arts and crafts, games, outdoor time and yummy snacks! Secondary students are also welcome to join us and get any needed homework assistance and social opportunities as well.

We have amazing staff and volunteers who are all dedicated to children and families who participate.



Placemaking refers to the deliberate act of improving the community in ways which the residents decide themselves. Examples include the creations of community gardens and community beautification programs.

Cleanup Program



Every year, 5th Ward participates in a community junk haul. During this, items such as broken equipment, furniture, and construction materials are transported to the city garage with the assistance of many volunteers.

Some wonderful local businesses sponsor this undertaking, and many fantastic volunteers make it happen, residents often go above and beyond to help each other each year.

The HOPE community also assists neighbors who may have outdoor property violations; We work with the property code inspector to get the needed information and create a plan of correction that is timely and manageable.

Memorial Garden



One of 5th Ward's most consistent desires was fresh veggies and fruit. Part of HOPE's solution was to create a community garden.

5th Ward's community has some residents whose roots go back generations and the community wanted to

honor their memory and contributions. Their objective was to construct a garden that would provide fresh food and also include perennial plants and flowers to honor the memories of lost relatives and friends.

Residents are currently looking at opportunities to expand the garden to increase the production of vegetables, and to grow fruit trees and berries.

BNGAGEMENT

Engagement refers to residents and our friends being involved in our community, from decision making and public works to having fun at community events. Examples include resident council meetings and community events.

HOPE Coffee Hour



The HOPE Community Coffee hour has grown to become a community staple. Aside from 5th Ward residents, guests from all over the area come every week to enjoy a warm beverage, pastry and mingle in the community.

We never know who we will see on any given Wednesday, but we know that the discussions will be lively, respectful and positive. This is where we create plans to resolve challenges and to celebrate our successes.

HOPE's coffee hour is proof that if a community has a foundation of trust, respect and compassion, they can share differing opinions and work towards solutions together.

City Teamwork



Residents of the HOPE community have been regularly engaging with elected officials and city employees to address safety concerns and poor infrastructure.

Last year when a terrible storm hit and severely

affected this community, assistance and repairs came in a timely manner. City officials were able to contact HOPE leaders who were already out assessing the situation and get real-time updates on damage, electrical problems, and anything else needed to quickly address the issues. Public Works officials also work with residents to find and repair any sinkholes or problems with drains and provide updates on upcoming or ongoing work.

NOTE FROM THE STEERING COMMITTEE



Neighborhoods in our area have tremendous pride in their histories and their people. At the same time, their potential has been stifled by the loss of major employers and well-paid jobs, poverty, violence and substance abuse. Many of their residents suffer from chronic diseases, disabilities, and the loss of hope in a brighter future.

For the past five years the HOPE initiative in Meadville's 5th Ward has supported residents in the development of leadership skills, helping each other to find their voices, and advocating for themselves and their neighborhood. Although a year and a half was mostly lost to the pandemic, this community has and is changing in so many ways. Neighbors and community leaders have been raised up to address risks and to bolster protective factors. Together they have built trust in themselves and each other.

The results are a cleaner, safer and more beautiful neighborhood; neighbors look out for each other including the most vulnerable residents. Working with community partners they have built a community garden, provided after school programs, launched a snow removal and lawn cutting mutual benefit project, and effectively advocated with elected leaders for long overdue maintenance to streets, sewer lines, and bridges. Every Wednesday finds residents meeting for coffee and conversation, walking groups are forming and await spring, and longer summer days will find them in the garden planning for adding fruit orchards and larger growing spaces. Summer evenings are often scheduled with meetings with elected officials, or discussing the planned redevelopment of the old Race Street Lumber, or simply meeting for game night.

The past few years have brought all of us tremendous opportunities to learn, grow, and understand the true meaning and work of loving your neighbor. As we roll into 2024, we are pursuing new opportunities to extend this work to other neighborhoods throughout the area. A generous grant from the Pennsylvania Coalition to Advance Respect will support this expansion as a strategy for reducing violence using our framework of trauma informed neighborhood development, as well as new evidence-based strategies to reduce harm and build resilience. Leaders and neighbors in 5 th Ward will be active participants in expanding this work. They will be mentoring emerging leaders in new neighborhoods, sharing their experiences and lessons learned, and cheering them on through the hard work that is needed to build trust, connection and healthy communities.

On behalf of the HOPE Steering Committee, we are humbled and devoted to supporting this ongoing work to transform our community.
